## Shared Concern over Neighborhood Disturbances

COLORADO COLLEGE representatives — including President Richard F. Celeste — and the Colorado Springs Police Department recently held a meeting with students, landlords, and neighbors to discuss disturbances in the three blocks north and east of campus. Police and college administrators sought to help attendees gain a better understanding of what each group is doing to improve the situation, how they can support one another in those efforts, and to share constructive suggestions.

The college shares the concerns about neighborhood disturbances and is committed to being a good neighbor.

Many of the college staff and faculty are neighbors as well and many students living off campus would appreciate a more peaceful neighborhood.

The college has taken positive steps to address the situation:

- CC has communicated extensively with both on-campus and off-campus students about appropriate behavior in the neighborhood.
- CC fully supports CSPD’s increased efforts to enforce open-container, minor-in-possession, noise, and other laws and ordinances.
- Student Life staff have met with the residents of each house about which the college has received a complaint and behavior appears to be changing.
- College administrators and students are working to significantly increase late-night, on-campus activities.
- Throughout the year, students receive extensive education regarding alcohol abuse.
- The college hires an off-duty CSPD officer on Friday and Saturday nights to patrol the area adjacent to the campus.
- CC and CSPD have increased communication and established a system whereby the college receives notices of summonses involving students within 24 hours.

The college encourages neighbors to take the following steps to address concerns:

- Contact students living nearby to develop positive relationships.

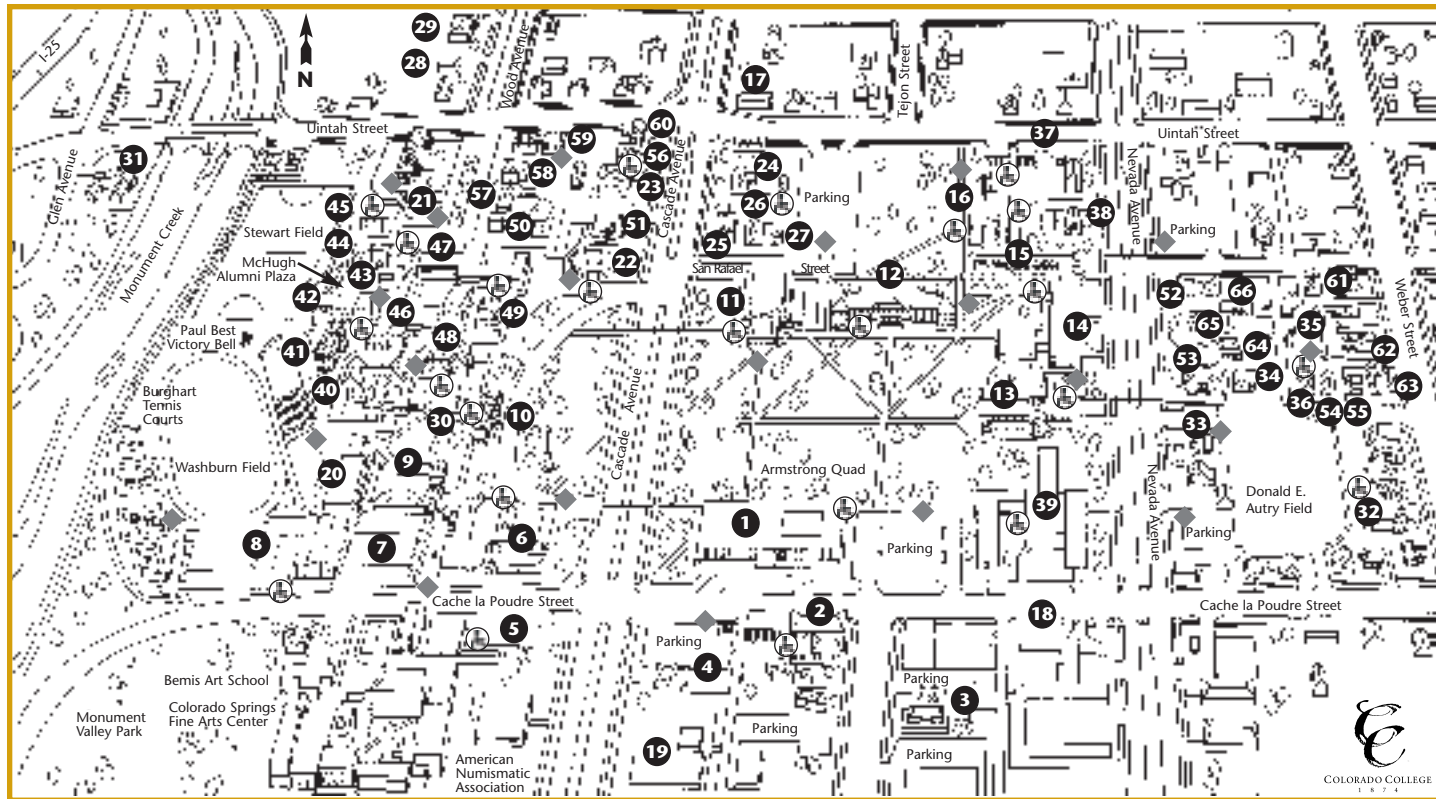

## CC by the Numbers

**COLORADO COLLEGE**, founded in 1874, two years before Colorado became a state, is a top-ranked, liberal arts and sciences college enrolling **2,000** students. Best known for the innovative Block Plan, where students take, and professors teach, only one course at a time, Colorado College has an average class size of **14**. From the beginning, Colorado College has been a co-educational institution; there were 25 students in the first class — 13 men and 12 women.

- Students come from **every state** in the nation and more than **24 countries**. In addition to undergraduate study, Colorado College offers a **Masters of Arts in Teaching**.
- **60 percent** of CC students receive financial aid.
- Colorado College contributes approximately **\$110 million** annually to the Colorado Springs economy.
- **2,300** alumni live in the Pikes Peak region.
- **84 percent** of CC students are involved in community service (compared to a national average of 36 percent). CC students volunteer in more than **115** local nonprofits, schools, and charities.
- The **class of 2008** was selected from the largest applicant pool in the history of the college.
- **51 percent** of the class of 2008 was ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school classes.
- **76 percent** of the students live on campus.
- Colorado College's Shove Chapel sponsors and/or hosts **25** religious organizations.

### Catch the Free Downtown Shuttle!

**W**ITH THE HELP of sponsorship from Colorado College, the free downtown shuttle was launched in the summer of 2004. Colorado College is the shuttle's northern terminus. Two shuttle stops are located near the college: one on the **east side of Tejon Street just south of Wooglin's Deli** and one on the **west side of Cascade Avenue by Packard Hall**.

The shuttle runs every 10 to 20 minutes **7 a.m. to 9 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays; 7 a.m. to 1 a.m. on Fridays; and 9:30 a.m. to 1 a.m. on Saturdays**. The shuttle runs a 1.7-mile route from CC through downtown to Moreno Avenue along Tejon Street and Cascade Avenue.
