DEPARTMENTAL AWARDS

ANTHROPOLOGY, presented by Professor Sarah Hutzinger
H. Marie Wormington Award — KARIN LINDE WANGBERG, AARON THOMAS RETKA
The H. Marie Wormington Award in Anthropology was established in 1979 by Dr. Wormington and her husband, Gordon D. Retka, to honor the outstanding graduating senior in anthropology. Dr. Wormington, who died in 1994, was a former curator of archaeology at the Denver Museum of Natural History and an adjunct professor at Colorado College. Her own career was devoted to the Paleo-Indian period of New World prehistory, but it was the couple's desire to recognize student achievements in the discipline as a whole. The criteria for the Wormington Award are a high academic record, notable aptitude for and accomplishment in field research, leadership and participation in the department's programs, and dedication to the discipline of anthropology.

Outstanding Senior Art Studio Show Award — DAVID EDWARD PRINCE

Mary Chenoweth Award — GEORGIA LEE ELROD, MCKENDREE ELY KEY
Mary Chenoweth taught art at Colorado College from 1957 through 1983. Professor Chenoweth, who died last year, is remembered not only as a dedicated artist, but as a free spirit with a zany sense of humor. When she retired, members of the Class of 1983 and other friends established a fund in her honor. Each year the award is given to the artist who has made the most best exemplifies Mary Chenoweth's talent, spirit, and humor.

Craig Herst Arts Prize Scholar Award — GISELLE MARIA RESTREPO
The CHAPS prize was established by family and friends in memory of Craig Herst, a member of the Class of 1989. The award was tragically died of injuries sustained from a car accident shortly after his graduation from Colorado College. A gifted artist and sculptor whose work reveals surprising maturity and sophistication, Craig is remembered fondly as being a very creative and personally engaging young man with a promising future in the arts. The Craig Herst Arts Prize Scholar or CHAPS prize is awarded annually to a junior studio art major who embodies Craig's passion for the arts and has demonstrated excellence during his/her career at Colorado College. The prize will support research or creative work, which may be a part of the recipient's senior show.

ASIAN STUDIES, presented by Professor Vibha Kapuria-Foreman
Excellence in Asian Studies — JENNIFER RENEE JOHNSON
The Asian studies faculty at Colorado College recognizes students with this prize, which celebrates their high academic achievement in Asian studies and their outstanding contributions to the success of this program.

BIOLOGY, presented by Professor Ron Capen
Mary Alice Hamilton Award in Biology — EWEN MACINTOSH CALLAWAY, RHEIT CHURCHILL MAYS

For many years the Biology Department has recognized the top graduating biology major with this award, which is based on academic performance and the biology department's undergraduate research and prospects for a successful career in biology. After the retirement of Professor Mary Alice Hamilton from the department in 1977, the Biology Department renamed the biology award in Professor Hamilton's honor to recognize her 27 years as a devoted faculty member in the department.

Richard G. and Reba Beidleman Award — BONNIE LOUISE KEELER, WILLIAM RUSSELL WIEDER
Upon his retirement in 1988, after 31 years in the Biology Department, Professor Beidleman established this award in honor of his wife, Reba Beidleman of the Burlington Northern Outstanding Teacher Award. The Beidleman Award is given annually to a student who has demonstrated, through classroom and field work, the greatest potential for becoming a professional ecologist or ecologist. In 1990, after the tragic death of Reba Beidleman in an automobile accident, the Biology Department added Reba's name to the award in recognition of her many contributions to environmental preservation in the Colorado Springs area.

Jason Wilkes Memorial Biology Award — ATSUSHI TANAKA
The Jason Wilkes Memorial Award is intended to recognize an outstanding minority student majoring in biology. This award was started by Lorna Wilkes in memory of her beloved son, Jason Wilkes, Class of 1993, who died in a climbing accident at the start of his senior year at Colorado College, and his lifelong interest in nature and the environment.

Alfred W. Alberts Summer Research Prize — ALEXANDER JACKSON MOORE
The Alfred W. Alberts Summer Research Prize is awarded to a deserving student who will conduct summer research in biochemistry or molecular biology.

CHEMISTRY, presented by Professor Ted Lindeman
Otis A. and Margaret T. Barnes Departmental Service Award — JENNIFER ANNE WENDEL, JODY GABRIELE RUSTMANN
This award was established in 1976 by an amendment to the Otis A. and Margaret T. Barnes Trust. It consists of a one-year membership in the American Chemical Society, paid by the trust, for the chemistry major who, in the judgment of the Chemistry Department faculty, has contributed the most in helping and furthering the chemistry program at Colorado College.

First-Year Chemistry Award — IAN O'BRIEN FERRIN-O'CONNELL
This award consists of the latest edition of the *CRC Handbook of Chemistry and Physics*, and is given to the freshman, regardless of major, who has been the most outstanding student in general chemistry in the past year. The handbook is supplied by the publisher, CRC Press, and this year will be the 54th annual presentation.

Merck Index Award in Biochemistry — DANIEL JAMES HAXTON
Merck Index Award in Biochemistry — MELINDA CHANEL CUSHING
Each of these awards is given to a graduating senior, based on scholastic achievement respectively in chemistry and biochemistry. They are sponsored by Merck and Co., Inc., in Kenilworth, New Jersey, the pharmaceutical company and publisher of the *Merck Index*, which is the handbook awarded. The award has been given nationally for more than 35 years.

ACS Analytical Chemistry Award
This award goes to a junior who has excelled in analytical chemistry courses and whose plans for a science career promise further work in this field. The award, sponsored by the American Chemical Society analytical division, includes a subscription to the ACS journal *Analytical Chemistry*.

Creclius Family Research Award
This award, presented for the first time this year, was established by the Creclius family: Dr. Daniel N. Creclius ('59) and Dr. Amahid Tashjian ('63) and their daughter, Dr. M. Creclius ('91). The award recognizes a chemistry or biochemistry student who has done extraordinary work in research. It is intended to assist the recipient with travel to present research at a major professional meeting. The award is announced annually.

CLASSICS, presented by Professor Maria Dobson
John Bryant and Miriam Gile Hartwell Prize — PATRICIA ANN KLEMPH
The prize was established in 1981 to honor one or two students who have displayed unusual interest and ability in study of the classics. Dr. Hartwell, a friend of the college and lover of the classics, graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Yale in 1900, received an M.A. from Harvard in 1904, and practiced surgery for many years in Colorado Springs. He married Miriam Gile, daughter of Moses Clement Gile, professor of classics at CC from 1892 to 1916, whose name is perpetuated in a chair at the college.

Gile Hartwell Summer Travel Prize — JENNIFER LYNN McFADDEN
Awarded this year for the first time, this prize will fund a student's travel to Rome or Athens.

COMPARATIVE LITERATURE, presented by Professor Owen Cramer
Excellence in Comparative Literature — LAURA ASHLEY MOHAUPT
The comparative literature faculty wishes to commend its exceptional students with this prize. It thereby recognizes their high academic achievements in course work, creativity in senior theses, as well as linguistic abilities and general personal contributions to the continuing success of this program.

DRAMA AND DANCE
Dorothy Caroline Dolan Award for Dance, presented by Professor Yunyu Wang
The Dolan Fund was established in 1999 by the three children of Dorothy Caroline Dolan to encourage an outstanding undergraduate to pursue the study of dance. Dorothy Caroline Dolan was a Colorado Springs resident whose goal was to become a professional dancer, but that aspiration was dashed in 1900, when she died from Harvey in 1904, and practicing surgery for many years in Colorado Springs. He married Miriam Gile, daughter of Moses Clement Gile, professor of classics at CC from 1892 to 1916, whose name is perpetuated in a chair at the college.

Broadway Theatre League Award, presented by Professor Yunyu Wang and Professor Clinton Turner Davis
— LINDSEY MARIE HALLOCK, KATHERINE ANNE DAVIS
In 1965 the Broadway Theatre League, in liquidating its assets, offered a donation to Colorado College indicating a preference that it be used to further drama on the campus. Since then, this award is given to an outstanding student or students in the Drama and Dance Department.

Pamela Riley Prize, presented by Professor Clinton Turner Davis
— KEVIN MICHAEL JOHNSON
During her 11 years at Colorado College, Pamela Riley taught and directed in the Drama and Dance Department. She was loved by our students because of her high performance standards, her infectious energy, her fearless dedication and her warm and generous personality. The Riley Prize is given to the graduating senior who has contributed similar qualities of devoted service and excellence to our program.

ECONOMICS AND BUSINESS, presented by Professor Libby Rittenberg
Kenneth J. Curran Award — RUOBEI PANG
The Kenneth J. Curran Award is the result of Dr. Curran's deep commitment to the liberal arts ideal. It is given to the graduate in economics with the highest academic average in courses taken in the Divisions of Humanities and Natural Sciences, with a minimum of nine units outside the Department of Economics.

Kenneth J. and Elizabeth Hare Curran Award — RUOBEI PANG
The Kenneth J. and Elizabeth Hare Curran Award is given each year to the outstanding senior graduate in economics. The award is given in memory of Professor Kenneth J. Curran and his wife, Elizabeth Hare Curran. He was a beloved teacher of economics, chairman of the department, and dean of the college.

Robert William Kaye Prize — DUSTIN LEE KITSON
The Robert William Kaye Prize is presented to the outstanding economics major with strong performance in business courses. Robert Kaye was a business major in the Class of 1941. He served his country in World War II in the U.S. Marine Corps and was killed in action in March 1944. This award was established by the family and friends of Captain Kaye.

Robert E. Rubin Award in Political Economy — CHRISTOPHER CHARLES WITT
This award is given to the outstanding senior graduate in either American Political Economy or International Political Economy.

Robert E. Rubin Award in Mathematical Economics — SISHIR BHATTARAI
This award is given to the outstanding senior graduate in Mathematical Economics.

EDUCATION, presented by Professor Charlotte Mendoza
Award for Excellence in Elementary Teacher Education — PETER TIMOTHY SIGLER

The Education Department honors two of its exemplary teacher education candidates as they are about to leave Colorado College and enter the teaching profession. The awards, one for an elementary and one for a secondary teacher education student, are given to those who have the best combine overall excellence in their academic and education programs with outstanding performance in student teaching.

Lori Anne Lowe Memorial Award
Lori Anne Lowe graduated from the Master of Arts in Teaching Elementary Education Program in 1991. Lori was in the midst of the exciting process of setting up her first classroom when she was killed. Lori was a person of integrity and genuine caring for all those around her, especially the children.

Her classmates, family, and friends established an endowed fund at the college so that proceeds from the fund could be used to make one or more cash awards to graduating MATIs who best exemplify her spirit and commitment to learners. The awards are given in August of each year to beginning teachers to assist them in setting up their classrooms for their new students.

ENGLISH, presented by Professor Barry Sarchett
Evelyn May Bridges Poetry Awards — NICOLE ANN PASINI
The Bridges prize for student poetry has been given for more than 60 years. The award honors Evelyn May Bridges, who, at age nine, published a poem about death that gained her national recognition. After Evelyn May died in early adolescence, her father entered the Bridges Poetry prize in her honor.

Adelaide Bender Reville Fiction Awards — JOSHUA MICHAEL KALVLEN
These awards were established in 1982 by Paul Reville, a 1971 graduate of Colorado College, in honor of his mother. The prizes recognize the best stories submitted in the spring of each year to a committee of members of the English Department.

Frank Krutzke Senior Project Award — VIVIAN TRIMBLE RUSSELL
The Krutzke Award was established in 1985 by a 1974 Colorado College graduate. It honors Frank Krutzke, who was taught in the English Department from 1939 to 1973. Professor Krutzke taught American literature as his specialty, but he was famous for the breadth of his reading and interests. He exemplified the dedicated teacher, scholarly and humane. The Krutzke Award honors the best critical (non-creative writing) senior essay.

The Colorado College Creative Writing Award — AMANDA MICHELLE MENENDEZ
The Colorado College Creative Writing Award was established by an anonymous donor. It is intended to recognize an outstanding student who, over a long period of time, has shown outstanding ability and dedication in the writing of poetry or fiction, both in and outside of the classroom. The award is intended to recognize the recipient's past achievement and help provide opportunities for him or her to go on writing.

The Colorado College Awards in Literature
Because of the generosity of an anonymous donor, the English Department is able to give financial awards to students to complete independent literary projects of either a creative or critical/academic nature. These students may return to the college after their summer or block projects, and may be majors in any department. (This award was presented to the students at an earlier date.)

This award is given to that senior (or sometimes junior) who has given exemplary service to the program and community and who also shows a strong interest in environmental science.

FORENSICS, presented by Bonnie Stapleton
Apolonian Award — CHRISTOPHER JOHN PALLANCH
The Apollonian Award is given annually to the outstanding students in forensics, has been given since 1907. The award was endowed by an anonymous donor and is in the form of a cash prize.

GEOLOGY, presented by Professor Christine Sildaway
Estwing Outstanding Senior Geologist Award — DREW DUNKIN BECKWITH, KARL ROBERT THOMPSON
Each year the Estwing Manufacturing Company of Rockford, Illinois, presents an award to an outstanding geology student at Colorado College for academic achievement and outstanding contribution to the geology Department. The person selected will receive an engraved geology rock pick.

Association for Women Geoscientists Award — BONNY JO HAWKINS
Each year the Association of Women Geoscientists presents awards to the outstanding women geoscientists students in colleges and universities throughout Colorado, Wyoming, and New Mexico. Certificates of Merit will be awarded to the honorees at the chapter's meeting in the Denver area. The person selected will also receive an engraved geology rock pick.

Rocky Mountain Association of Geologists Award — SETH G. COWDERY
The Neal J. Harr Memorial Outstanding Student Award is made in recognition of exceptional scholastic achievement for the purpose of encouraging excellence in the field of earth sciences. Presentation at a regular RMAG luncheon meeting will include an engraved RMAG Geology Pick Award for the outstanding senior class geology student from each of 11 colleges and universities in Colorado.

William A. Fischer Special Recognition Award — JAMES CORY OROFINO
The William A. Fischer Special Recognition Award is given on occasion to a senior geology major who has demonstrated unusual ability, breadth, and interest in both the liberal arts and sciences. The person selected will receive an engraved geology rock pick.

Donald B. Gould Scholarship Award in Geology
The Donald B. Gould Award is presented each year to upper-division geology majors who have demonstrated outstanding achievement for the purpose of provided by the Donald B. Gould Scholarship Fund, established by a group of alumni whose academic and professional lives were influenced by their study of geology at Colorado College. Their gratitude for the teaching and example of Donald B. Gould led them to establish this award to recognize and honor him by providing similar opportunities for budding young geologists.

Abbott Prize in Sociology — ABIGAIL MORIS BRECKENRIDGE, WREN MELISSA GADWAD
The Abbott Prize in Sociology honors the memory of W. Lewis Abbott who was a member of the Colorado College faculty from 1920 to 1949. Professor Abbott was stimulating in his teaching, controversial in his positions, and beloved and respected by his students and colleagues.

WOMEN'S STUDIES, presented by Professor Eileen Bresnahan
McGee Prize in Women's Studies — ELEANOR HUN COLLINSON
The McGee Prize in Women's Studies honors the memory of Shannon McGee, who was a gifted and enthusiastic student, a passionate individual, and an ardent feminist.

ALL-COLLEGE AWARDS
ABEL J. AND LUCY PHINNEY GREGG AWARD, presented by Chaplain Bruce R. Coriell
— MOLLY KATHERINE MAYFIELD, ALEXANDER MARK ZOLOT
In the first half of the 20th century, A. Gregg was a leader in the YMCA, an organization that sought to break down barriers and offer a new global vision. A strong proponent of higher education, Lucy Phinney Gregg earned her master's degree at the age of 60 and served as mentor to countless undergraduate students. In 1937, she was named to the college awards a prize to study or students who have demonstrated academic excellence, critical religious interest, and a commitment to serve the community.

ALPHA LAMBDA DELTA BOOK AWARD, presented by Chereita Quana Rochelle
— ANNE ELIZABETH BOYD
To the senior with the highest grade point average who was a member of Alpha Lambda Delta during the freshman year.

ANN RICE MEMORIAL AWARD, presented by Molly Mayfield
— RAEGAN LEEANN TRUAX
Harold and Miriam Rice established the Ann Rice Memorial Award in 1950, after their only daughter died suddenly of a rare blood disease. Ann had been a first-year student at Colorado College, her mother's alma mater, for only five weeks before her death. The Rice award is considered an honorary daughter from the college each year since, creating an extended family that now numbers 51 women. Even though Mr. and Mrs. Rice have died, a "daughter" is still selected each year from the junior class for her personal contributions to the college through dedication to the goals of a liberal arts education.

BLUE KEY AWARD, presented by Barbara Swenson, Blue Key President
— PROFESSOR TED LINDEMAN
To a member of the faculty or administration who contributes significant time and effort to the student body of Colorado College, the Colorado College community, and the city of Colorado Springs.

CHRISTOPHER JOHNSTON PRIZE FOR FELLOWSHIP AND SERVICE, presented by Ben Mink and Linda J. Johnson
— DANIEL GABRIELE RUSTMANN
The Christopher Johnston Prize was established to commemorate the qualities and concern for human values reflected by Christopher Johnston, a member of the Class of 1972. The prize is intended to recognize a senior student who is a member of a fraternity. The qualities of character and leadership which define the award are: intellectual promise as well as the choice of recipient, together with exhibition of fellowship toward others, generosity of spirit, and a consistent and genuine interest in the well-being of others.

COLORADO COLLEGE PRIZE ON WAR, VIOLENCE, AND HUMAN VALUES, presented by Professor William Hochman

To the best student work illustrating war, violence, and human values with emphasis on the human experience of war.

CRONIN LEADERSHIP ESSAY PRIZE, presented by Professor Lief Carter
— ADAM LAWRENCE PRINGLE
The Cronin Leadership Essay Prize is awarded to the student who submits the best essay on political or social leadership. The prize has been endowed by Thomas Cronin, formerly McHugh Distinguished Professor at Colorado College and now president of Whitman College in Washington state.

E. K. GAYLORD AWARD, presented by Jennifer Cross — ERIC THOMAS MARTENS
This award was established in honor of Mr. E. K. Gaylord, a member of the Class of 1897 and president of the Oklahoma Publishing Company until his death in 1974 at the age of 77. Mr. Gaylord was a generous supporter of Colorado College and his lifetime service to the college was recognized in 1974. Because of his own career in journalism, he took a special interest in student publications. For that reason, the E. K. Gaylord Award is given each year to a junior or senior for continuing contributions to Colorado College publications.

DAVID AND KAREN SMITH COWPERTHWAIT AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN MUSIC
The David and Karen Smith Cowperthwaite Award for Excellence in Music was established in 1962 by Ruth Barton and was established in 1990. David Cowperthwaite was a member of the Colorado College Class of 1960 and his wife, Karen, was enrolled as a member of the Class of 1962 when they were killed by lightning during a mountain expedition in 1960. The David and Karen Smith Cowperthwaite Award for Excellence in Music was instituted by their parents in their memory in 1962, the year Karen would have graduated.

NEUROSCIENCE
Arnold B. Scheibel Neuroscience Award
Arnold B. Scheibel was given for the outstanding neuroscience graduating senior.

PHILOSOPHY, presented by Professor Jonathan Lee
J. Glenn Gray Award — KAJIA MARIE WYCISK
J. Glenn Gray was a distinguished member of the Colorado College Philosophy Department for many years. He believed in the civilizing function of philosophical inquiry and dedicated his life to inculcating its values in his students. The J. Glenn Gray Award honors those students who share his passion for philosophy and best demonstrate his skill and sensitivity at philosophical analysis.
Robert Lewis Award — CHERETA QUANA ROCHELLE
— ANNA MARGARETHA MAZUR
In 1980, Robert L. Lewis graduated from Colorado College as a philosophy major, the youngest of three brothers and the son of a mother who attended the college. In 1987, Bob died tragically. He was a young man of exceptional gentleness of spirit, philosophical thoughtfulness, and personal integrity. He was a devoted teacher and mentor. He was a devoted father to a student who knew him well felt that he added to the meaning of their endeavors at the college and to the value of their own lives. In Bob's memory, his family and friends have established an award open to junior students from all departments. This award is given for summer research in philosophy to students who reflect Bob's intellectual qualities and his concern with human values.

PHYSICS, presented by Professor Barbara Whitten
David and Karen Smith Cowperthwaite Award for Excellence in Physics
— ANNE ELIZABETH BOYD
David Cowperthwaite was a member of the Colorado College Class of 1960 and his wife, Karen, was enrolled as a member of the Class of 1962 when they were killed by lightning during a mountain expedition in 1960. The David and Karen Smith Cowperthwaite Award for Excellence in Physics was instituted by their parents in their memory in 1962, the year Karen would have graduated.

POLITICAL SCIENCE, presented by Professor David Hendrickson
Edith H. Barton Award — ANNE ELIZABETH BOYD
This award honors Edith Bramhall, who taught political science at Colorado College from 1920 to 1946. She was one of the first women to earn a Ph.D. in political science in the United States. The award is given annually to a student thought by the department faculty to be the outstanding scholar in the department.

Fred Sondermann Award — JORGE ANDRES CEDRON, JOHN STEPHEN JUECH
This award honors Fred A. Sondermann, who taught in the Political Science Department from 1953 to 1978. Professor Sondermann was noted not only for his teaching and scholarship, but also for his service to the college community. The award is given annually for overall academic and contribution to the department.

PREMEDICAL, presented by Professor Lannont Anderson
Frank Henry John Figue Award — MELINDA CHANEL CUSHING
The Frank Henry John Figue Award was established in 1964 by Dr. Frank Henry J. Figue of the Class of 1927. Dr. Figue's purpose in establishing this award was to recognize outstanding premedical students at Colorado College. Dr. Figue was a distinguished member of the Colorado College faculty and for many years was the chairman of the Department of Anatomy at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. He was the editor and translator of the eighth and ninth English editions of the *Soboto Atlas of Human Anatomy*. It is the latest edition of this outstanding two-volume set that is awarded each year to the outstanding premedical student at Colorado College. The recipient of this award is selected in recognition of scholarship, leadership, and service to fellow premedical students.

The Caduceus Award — KIMBERLY DAWN TATE, REGAN REBE BROCKMEYER
The Caduceus Award is a community service and community activity award that is given by the pre-health office for outstanding student involvement. This award is not given annually, but is given to the student(s) who shows a different or her innovation, creativity, and overall character and drive to make a difference in the lives of the community. The Caduceus, the universal symbol of medicine, the wand of Hermes, reaffirms our commitment to these ideals.

PSYCHOLOGY, presented by Professor Kristi Erdal
William Arthur Blakely Memorial Award — DAKOTA RENEE COREY
The William Arthur Blakely Award is financed through funds provided by the family and friends of Dr. Blakely, who was a member of the Psychology Department from 1931 to 1959 and chair during most of that period. The award is presented to a student who shows exceptional promise for a career in psychology.

Cornelia Manley Sabine Award — ERON DESAIRE MCLAUGHLIN, KATHERINE ELIZABETH SUPINGER
This award is presented annually to the outstanding graduating psychology senior on behalf of Cornelia Sabine, Class of '47, a longtime supporter of Colorado College and the Psychology Department. This award serves as a tribute to Cornelia, who has had a long and distinguished career in public service and a scholarship working with both children and adults in Colorado. After receiving a bachelor's degree in music from Northwestern University, Cornelia and her husband, Paul, moved to Colorado Springs in 1947, where she obtained a B.A., magna cum laude, and an M.A. in human behavior from Colorado College. She then worked in educational and social settings from Stanford University, and became a licensed clinical psychologist in Colorado Springs, where she maintained a private practice for 30 years. Her advice to students is to use their knowledge of psychology to bring peace and understanding into relationships in our fractious modern world.

Felisa Llorente Award — AMY ELIZABETH CARMAN
This award was established in honor of Mrs. Felisa Llorente, who was the official "mother" of the Spanish House for many years. She was generous with her time and talents in serving students to improve their Spanish speaking skills of many of them, both physically and intellectually. Mrs. Llorente made costumes for plays and supported all activities of the Romance Languages Department. She was a generous, warm-hearted woman who will long be remembered.

Jeanne Gibbs Memorial Award — DEVIN THOMAS GASKELL, NITIN DAVE COONJOEBEHARRY
Jeanne Gibbs was a 1962 graduate of the college who spent her junior year in France on a Fulbright Award. Her mother established the memorial award following Jeanne's death in an automobile accident. The award is to be used in "some special way to enlarge or enhance a student's experience in France."

The Linda Hare Goddard 1977 Memorial Award
This honor is awarded to three students, one each in French, Spanish, and Italian, who exhibit qualities of academic excellence and a high level of enthusiasm and curiosity toward the opportunity to study and experience life in a foreign country.

SOCIOLOGY, presented by Professor Eli Boderman
Abbott Prize in Sociology — ABIGAIL MORIS BRECKENRIDGE, WREN MELISSA GADWAD
The Abbott Prize in Sociology honors the memory of W. Lewis Abbott who was a member of the Colorado College faculty from 1920 to 1949. Professor Abbott was stimulating in his teaching, controversial in his positions, and beloved and respected by his students and colleagues.

WOMEN'S STUDIES, presented by Professor Eileen Bresnahan
McGee Prize in Women's Studies — ELEANOR HUN COLLINSON
The McGee Prize in Women's Studies honors the memory of Shannon McGee, who was a gifted and enthusiastic student, a passionate individual, and an ardent feminist.

ALL-COLLEGE AWARDS
ABEL J. AND LUCY PHINNEY GREGG AWARD, presented by Chaplain Bruce R. Coriell
— MOLLY KATHERINE MAYFIELD, ALEXANDER MARK ZOLOT
In the first half of the 20th century, A. Gregg was a leader in the YMCA, an organization that sought to break down barriers and offer a new global vision. A strong proponent of higher education, Lucy Phinney Gregg earned her master's degree at the age of 60 and served as mentor to countless undergraduate students. In 1937, she was named to the college awards a prize to study or students who have demonstrated academic excellence, critical religious interest, and a commitment to serve the community.

ALPHA LAMBDA DELTA BOOK AWARD, presented by Chereita Quana Rochelle

To the senior with the highest grade point average who was a member of Alpha Lambda Delta during the freshman year.

ANN RICE MEMORIAL AWARD, presented by Molly Mayfield
— RAEGAN LEEANN TRUAX
Harold and Miriam Rice established the Ann Rice Memorial Award in 1950, after their only daughter died suddenly of a rare blood disease. Ann had been a first-year student at Colorado College, her mother's alma mater, for only five weeks before her death. The Rice award is considered an honorary daughter from the college each year since, creating an extended family that now numbers 51 women. Even though Mr. and Mrs. Rice have died, a "daughter" is still selected each year from the junior class for her personal contributions to the college through dedication to the goals of a liberal arts education.

BLUE KEY AWARD, presented by Barbara Swenson, Blue Key President
— PROFESSOR TED LINDEMAN
To a member of the faculty or administration who contributes significant time and effort to the student body of Colorado College, the Colorado College community, and the city of Colorado Springs.

CHRISTOPHER JOHNSTON PRIZE FOR FELLOWSHIP AND SERVICE, presented by Ben Mink and Linda J. Johnson
— DANIEL GABRIELE RUSTMANN
The Christopher Johnston Prize was established to commemorate the qualities and concern for human values reflected by Christopher Johnston, a member of the Class of 1972. The prize is intended to recognize a senior student who is a member of a fraternity. The qualities of character and leadership which define the award are: intellectual promise as well as the choice of recipient, together with exhibition of fellowship toward others, generosity of spirit, and a consistent and genuine interest in the well-being of others.

CRONIN LEADERSHIP ESSAY PRIZE, presented by Professor Lief Carter

The Cronin Leadership Essay Prize is awarded to the student who submits the best essay on political or social leadership. The prize has been endowed by Thomas Cronin, formerly McHugh Distinguished Professor at Colorado College and now president of Whitman College in Washington state.

E. K. GAYLORD AWARD, presented by Jennifer Cross — ERIC THOMAS MARTENS
This award was established in honor of Mr. E. K. Gaylord, a member of the Class of 1897 and president of the Oklahoma Publishing Company until his death in 1974 at the age of 77. Mr. Gaylord was a generous supporter of Colorado College and his lifetime service to the college was recognized in 1974. Because of his own career in journalism, he took a special interest in student publications. For that reason, the E. K. Gaylord Award is given each year to a junior or senior for continuing contributions to Colorado College publications.

DAVID AND KAREN SMITH COWPERTHWAIT AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN MUSIC
The David and Karen Smith Cowperthwaite Award for Excellence in Music was established in 1962 by Ruth Barton and was established in 1990. David Cowperthwaite was a member of the Colorado College Class of 1960 and his wife, Karen, was enrolled as a member of the Class of 1962 when they were killed by lightning during a mountain expedition in 1960. The David and Karen Smith Cowperthwaite Award for Excellence in Music was instituted by their parents in their memory in 1962, the year Karen would have graduated.

Glenn Gray Award honors those students who share his passion for philosophy and best demonstrate his skill and sensitivity at philosophical analysis.
Robert Lewis Award — CHERETA QUANA ROCHELLE

In 1980, Robert L. Lewis graduated from Colorado College as a philosophy major, the youngest of three brothers and the son of a mother who attended the college. In 1987, Bob died tragically. He was a young man of exceptional gentleness of spirit, philosophical thoughtfulness, and personal integrity. He was a devoted teacher and mentor. He was a devoted father to a student who knew him well felt that he added to the meaning of their endeavors at the college and to the value of their own lives. In Bob's memory, his family and friends have established an award open to junior students from all departments. This award is given for summer research in philosophy to students who reflect Bob's intellectual qualities and his concern with human values.

David and Karen Smith Cowperthwaite Award for Excellence in Physics
