# Barbara Ehrenreich

Capstone Address, NSO 2009



As the daughter of a distinguished miner, Barbara Ehrenreich spent most of her childhood moving around the country with her family, her only roots being her birthplace of Butte, Montana. She later attended Reed College in Portland, Oregon and, after graduating with a degree in physics, she received a PhD in cell biology from Rockefeller University. Her involvement with the anti-Vietnam war movement in college guided her to a career in activism, and she was determined not to spend her life “at the [laboratory] bench.” Ehrenreich’s involvement with advocacy for health care for New York City’s poor led her to investigative reporting. She says that “There was no decision to become a writer; that was just something I started doing.”

After the birth of her first child in 1970, Ehrenreich became aware of the sexism involved in women’s health care. She got involved with the movement, eventually co-authoring an “underground bestseller”, a pamphlet called *Witches, Midwives, and Nurses: A History of Women Healers*. After quitting her job at the State University of New York, Ehrenreich’s big break came when she published an article about the myth that feminism causes heart disease.

She says that after this article, her life settled into three tracks, which continue to this day: 1) Journalism. 2) Book length projects on subjects that fascinate her. Her other works include *For Her Own Good: 200 Years of the Experts’ Advice to Women*, *The Hearts of Men: American Dreams and the Flight from Commitment*, *Fear of Falling: The Inner Life of the Middle Class*, and many more. 3) Activism (specifically on healthcare, women’s rights, peace, and economic justice).

Since 2001, Ehrenreich has published *Bait and Switch* and *Dancing in the Streets: A History of Collective Joy*. Together with a group of people she met on her *Bait and Switch* book tour, she started a group called United Professionals, which creates awareness about the war on the middle class.

In response to questions about her dual role as an objective reporter and activist, Ehrenreich states: “I can’t imagine getting involved in a problem as a journalist and not wanting to do something about it, whether that means marching, picketing, leafleting, or helping build an organization for social change. Besides, a lot of my inspiration as a journalist comes from what I experience as an activist.”
