Coalition for the Homeless; Susanna Penfield ('20), who was accepted into an MSc program in Gender, Media and Culture at the London School of Economics and Political Science; Sally Hedderman (Minor '21), who was awarded a PIFP fellowship at the Denver Scholarship Foundation; Spencer Spotts ('17), who has enrolled in the MA program in Clinical Mental Health Counseling Program at the University of Colorado Denver; and Desirae Martinez (Minor '12), who earned her MD from the University of Colorado School of Medicine and is in

Regarding our faculty, Professor Nadia Guessous was elected to serve on the Faculty Executive Committee and was appointed Associate Director of the program. She was also invited to join the editorial board of the *AGITATE! Unsettling Knowledges* collective, an online antidisciplinary journal and a non-hierarchical platform that seeks to intervene in, and transform, the dominant ethics, aesthetics, and politics of authoring and claiming expertise. As a member of the board, Dr. Guessous will be providing feedback on the content, direction, and publicity of the journal, and making suggestions for new visions and approaches to agitating modes of writing, thinking, and being that dominate professionalized fields in academia, arts, and activism. She was also invited to become one of the founding members of a transnational and interdisciplinary research collective provisionally entitled "Thinking the Decolonial in North Africa," composed of scholars, writers, and artists based in Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, Europe, and North America who want to become more conversant with decolonial thought and think about decolonization as an epistemology for the study of the Maghrib. The collective will be working on multiple projects, including an edited volume, workshops, and conference on decolonizing the Maghrib.

Professor Rushaan Kumar also continues to demonstrate his commitment to collective work, successfully launched his LGBTQ+ Oral History Project (OHP) with a live event in October co-hosted by the Colorado College Fine Arts Center and Colorado College Mobile Arts. The event featured live performances by artists and project participants and was a resounding success. Of note, OHP was created in collaboration with students in his Senior Seminar course, who found the project inspiring due to their experiences working with the community, better understading the methods and impact oral histories have in traditional

archives, and reflecting on the ways notions of 'LGBTQ' and 'community' have changed over the last few decades. For his work, Dr. Kumar received the "Exemplary Achievement in Community-Engaged Research" award from the Colorado College Collaborative for Community Engagement. Additionally, we are so excited to announce he was recently appointed Senior Fellow at the Center for Applied Transgender Studies!

As for me, I published my first book, *In Audre's Footsteps: Transnational Kitchen Table Talk*, the 7<sup>th</sup> edition of Ingeborg-Bachmann prize-winner Sharon Dodua Otoo's Witnessed Series (Edition Assemblage). Just prior, I was elected Secretary of the <u>National Women's Studies Association</u>, I was elected to the Colorado College Faculty Executive Committee, and I was appointed inaugural Chair of the Community Safety Accountability Committee by President L.



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Song Richardson. As you can see, this has been and will continue to be a particularly busy year for me, but I remain excited about and honored to do the work I've been trusted with by members of my professional communities. On that note, I've decided the time has come for me to step down as Director of Feminist & Gender Studies. While I will sincerely miss sitting in the director's chair, I am eager for Professor Guessous to step into the role, and I hope you all will give her lots of support and encouragement as she takes the program in new, exciting directions.
