## PHILOSOPHY MAJOR CHECKLIST

**OVERVIEW**: The **Philosophy major requires a minimum of 12 units**, balancing work in major philosophical traditions, logic and writing, and advanced studies. The major allows for 2-4 units of electives, depending on what 300-level courses are taken. **Majors with emphases** require 14 units and allow students to gain advanced expertise in one of the subfields or areas of interest in philosophy. The Department recommends that students declare the major by the end of their sophomore year. Note: No more than 4 courses by the same instructor (excluding the Senior Essay and Senior Seminar) may count toward completion of the major.

To obtain the designation of an emphasis, a student must take an additional two units of philosophy in the area chosen (for a total of 14 units in philosophy, rather than 12) and also complete the senior essay in that area.
