### new courses added!

- B4: SO290 Constructing Solidarity and Mutual Aid in the Pandemic Era with Professor Eric Popkin \* This course explores the concept and practice of mutual aid organizing historically and its underlying premise of "solidarity." Students will examine specific organizing efforts in the era of COVID-19.
- J-B: SO290 Crimmigration: The criminalization of immigration and immigrants with Professor Florencia Rojo \* This course bridges the sociology of race, immigration, and critical criminology to understand the intersections between US immigration policy and the criminal punishment system.
- B5: SO290 Global Mental Health Policy
  with Professor Chantal Figueroa \* Presents a decolonial critique of the bio-medical model of mental health, posing
  the question "what is mental health?" from a historical & community-level frame. This course examines how power is
  inherent in mental health, employing an intersectional, interdisciplinary and decolonial approach.
- **B8: SO290 Poverty and Social Welfare in the U.S.**with Professor Cayce Hughes \* A sociological examination of poverty in the U.S. and the social welfare programs that aim to mitigate it. Students will consider competing theories about the underlying causes of poverty, how these ideas have informed policy, and critically assess the contemporary social welfare regime.

Dr. Hughes research and teaching interests include urban poverty, social inequalities, privacy and surveillance, the safety net, and health. He is currently working on a book examining how low-income, Black mothers in a high-poverty neighborhood in Houston, TX, navigate privacy when they seek assistance from an increasingly surveillance-centered safety net. In his spare time, Dr. Hughes loves cooking, baking, gardening, and trying to tame his two cats whose current mission is to interrupt Zoom meetings. He is excited to meet students and get to know CC as much as possible in the strangest of times!



I am excited to be joining the department of Sociology this fall and meeting students old and new.
