SO 130 ENVIRONMENTAL SOCIOLOGY (BLOCK C; REMOTE ONLY)



This course explores the intersection of social systems and environmental issues, focusing on three broad areas: 1) drivers of environmental degradation associated with global capitalism and the design of our systems for food production, housing, transportation, and energy; 2) global and domestic environmental inequality; and 3) how sociological insights can inform strategies for progressive environmental reforms. In addition to engaging with core theories in the field and critical case studies, students will develop proficiency in ArcGIS Pro to conduct geospatial analyses of environmental inequity.
