Community-Based Half-Block Research Grace Perry '18 to Publish Senior Capstone



Over half-block, majors honed their data analysis skills by completing research projects for different organizations in Colorado Springs. Community partners included Planned Parenthood, Foundations for Successful Living, and the El Paso County Combined Courthouse. "These half block projects are winwins," said Prof. Murphy-Geiss, who leades the classes each year. "Community partners get high quality research which they could never afford otherwise for free (Planned Parenthood estimated the worth at \$10,000), and students get hands-on experience both working with non-profit organizations and also doing applied research with real data to answer realworld questions."



Sociology major Grace Perry '18 will be taking her senior research beyond the Tutt archives this summer, and will publish her work with the intersex community in the peerreviewed Journal of

Androgyny. Though originally Perry was not planning on publishing her work, the wide variety of academic journal types has her confident that all students can find a source suitable to their passions. "I would definitely encourage other students to be more intentional and active about seeking out publication opportunities because I argue everyone at CC has probably completed a work worth publishing during their time here!" Perry's covers intersex activists like Sean Saifa Wall (pictured above) and their response to intersex infant surgeries.
