Sociology Major Requirements (11 credits)

Required Courses (5 credits)

- SO228 Social Theory
- SO229 Research Design
- SO401/2 Quantitative *or* Qualitative Methods
- SO450 Senior Thesis/Capstone (2 credits)
 - Research or theory paper; or
 - Community-based research paper; or
 - Community action project and paper

Electives (6 credits)

- No more than three 100-level electives may count toward the major
- At least one 300-level elective (prior to SO450)
- Study abroad programs that include a sociological element may contribute 1 elective unit to the major

Common Timeline for Progressing Through Major

- First Year: Two 100-level electives or one 100-level and one 200-level elective.
- Second Year: SO228 and SO229 (fall or spring); one or two electives at the 200-level
- Third Year: Approximately two electives at the 200 or 300-level; may consider taking SO301 or SO302
- Fourth Year: SO401 or SO402; one or two electives at the 200- or 300-level; SO450 Senior Thesis; SO451 Senior Seminar (optional)

Competencies and Skill Sets

Sociological Thinking

- Use sociological methods of thought, inquiry, and analysis to understand and address social issues.

Research Skills

- Qualitative (Interviewing, ethnography, interactions research, observations, NVIVO)
- Quantitative (SPSS, Stata, ArcGIS, R, data analysis and visualization, statistical modeling)
- Community Based (applied research, collaboration in research needs, community engagement)
- Hypothesis testing, program evaluation
- Survey design, sampling techniques

What is sociology?

Sociology seeks to understand the actions of individuals and groups by situating them within their social and institutional contexts. Sociologists work to discover and reveal the underlying regularities of social life—how patterns of inequality and behavior come to be and how they are reproduced or changed over time. We analyze both how social structures shape action and how, in turn, actions may reproduce or transform those structures. The scope of sociology is quite broad, ranging from the study of emotions, identities, or fleeting encounters to the analysis of global social structures and processes. The purpose of our curriculum is to familiarize students with the basic approach and insights of sociology, its major theoretical approaches, and the ways in which sociological habits of thought can enrich our self-understandings and enhance our capacity to bring about positive social change. Additionally, students develop competencies in research methodologies, community-based research, and modes of social change, such as activism and social policy.

What can I do with a degree in sociology?

Sociology prepares students for a wide variety of careers and life-long learning. Our students have gone on to careers in the public, private, and nonprofit sectors.
