SO 190/SP 308 – TOPICS IN SOCIOLOGY: CUERPO Y TERRITORIO.

PROFESSOR CHANTAL FIGUEROA

This course is guided by the question: How to be in community? and centers theorizations of Maya feminist scholars. During this class, students are asked to bring theories to action through the writing and performing of a play in Spanish. This performance will stem from a weeklong workshop with Maya artists.

Fulfills the Creative Process requirement (pending).

TUITION AND FEES:

Students pay the normal Colorado College tuition for the Fall semester; financial aid carries over. Airfare is covered up to \$800. Your normal on-campus room & board fees, or an equivalent program fee is also billed.

ADDITIONAL COSTS:

Personal expenses and books approx. \$950.

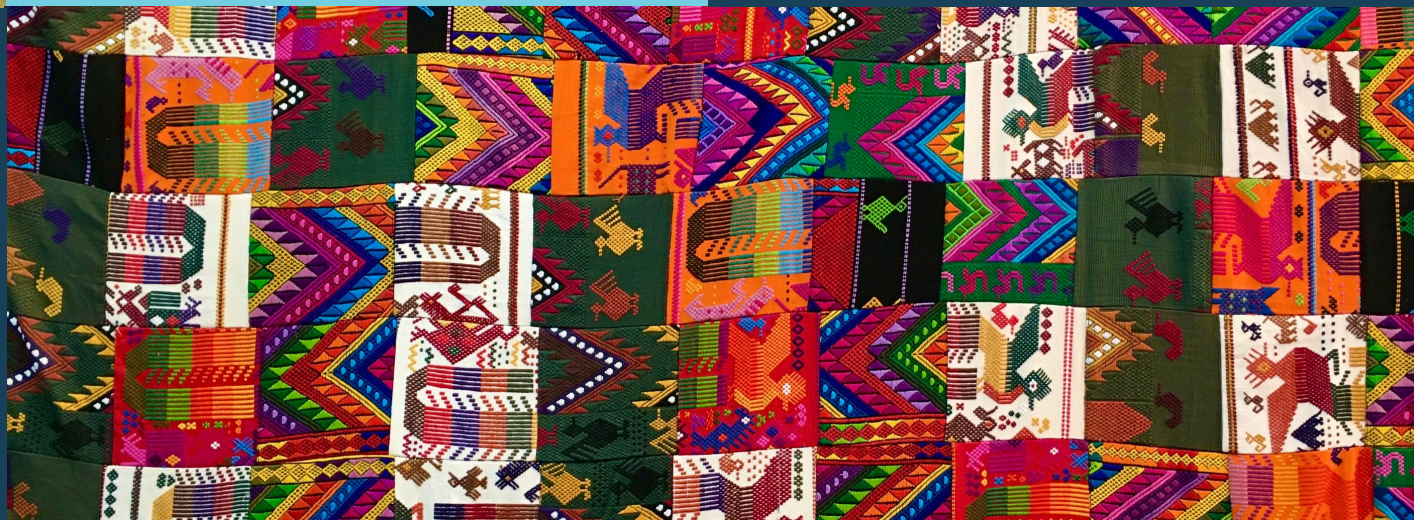
BLOCK 3

SP 312 – ORAL PRACTICE AND COMPOSITION ABROAD: CULTURA YUCATECA: VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS.

PROFESSOR NAOMI WOOD

Through an exploration of visual and performing arts, this course will examine the dominant narratives of the Yucatán's regional identity. As the second largest Indigenous population in México and the dominant population in Mérida, Maya artistic influence will be the primary focus of this course as we look at urbanization, changing industries, and creative social movements.

Fulfills 1 unit of the language study requirement. Fulfills the Equity & Power - Global requirement (pending).



Both courses count for the minor and the major in Spanish. Both courses may also count toward the 5-unit Latin American Studies minor (contact a LAS advisor if interested).

This is a two-block program. Individual blocks are not an option.

POSSIBLE PROGRAM-SPONSORED TRIPS INCLUDE:

Chichén Itzá and Uxmal archeological sites, Valladolid, Hacienda Yaxcopoil, and the Celestún biosphere reserve.

ROOM AND BOARD:

Students live with host families. All meals while with your host family are provided.
