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## Studying abroad or away for Political Science credit

If you are interested in using a course taken while studying off-campus toward a major/minor in Political Science or one of the joint majors in which Political Science is a participant, you should:

1. **Declare** your major and consult an advisor in the Political Science Department, if you have not already done so.
2. Talk to your **departmental advisor** about courses in the intended off-campus study program that might satisfy requirements for the major or minor in Political Science or for Political Science requirements for one of the joint majors.
3. While students can and should come up with a few options for courses to take while off-campus, please note that the Political Science department normally accepts only **one unit taken abroad** to fulfill (replace) Political Science requirements.
4. Once you determine with your advisor which are the best course options for your time studying off-campus, you can **submit** an official course approval request using the Summit system, or add one of the pre-approved courses already in Summit. Please note, you are REQUIRED to upload a **syllabus** to new requests (a course description alone is not sufficient).

### SIT Semester Study Abroad Program Highlights

- ➔ Advance your knowledge of a specific **Critical Global Issue (above right)** such as global health, migration, social change, human rights, education, arts and media, and sustainable development
- ➔ Gain new **language proficiency**. From Afrikaans to Wolof, SIT programs offer classes in and exposure to more than 25 languages.
- ➔ Learn how to conduct **undergraduate field research** abroad. SIT semester programs strongly emphasize field-based undergraduate research. SIT faculty and staff provide you with relevant coursework instruction, field experience, and guidance so you'll be able to complete a major undergraduate research project that can serve as a springboard for future achievements such as senior theses or Fulbright proposals.
- ➔ Live with local **host families** in both urban and rural settings to acquire diverse and meaningful vantage points within your host country. Study with a **small group** of students on each program while being supported by SIT faculty and staff, homestay families, in-country experts, and community members

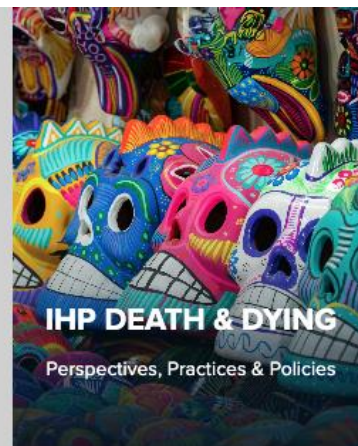
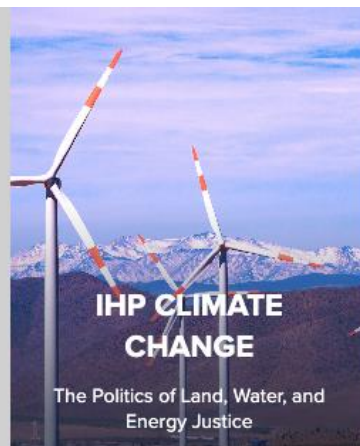

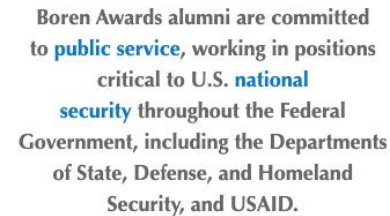

# Applying!

## Year, Semesters & Half-Semesters

- All study away *always* requires a SUMMIT application.
- For a partner semester/year program, you fill out the "CC Internal Application for Study Away Approval" in Summit, PLUS the program's application itself.
- The CC Internal Application is due **March 15** for Fall Semesters/Year Away, and **October 15** for Spring Semesters Away: APPLY EARLY.
- Partner Program application deadlines vary; check the website – early application is always strongly encouraged!
