BLACK VOTERS

CONSERVATION

41% believe that loss of habitat for fish and wildlife is an extremely or very serious problem.

777% support constructing wildlife crossing structures across major highways that intersect with known migration routes.

70% think more emphasis should be placed on conserving wildlife migration routes than on new development, roads, ranching, or oil and gas production in those areas.

ENERGY ON PUBLIC LANDS

71% support only allowing oil and gas companies the right to drill in areas where there is high likelihood to actually produce oil and gas.

67% prefer that leaders place more emphasis on protecting water, air, wildlife habitat and recreation opportunities over maximizing the amount of land available for drilling and mining.

82% support requiring oil and gas companies, rather than federal and state governments, to pay for all of the clean-up and land restoration costs after drilling is finished.
