CLIMATE CHANGE

75% believe climate change is a serious problem.

85% believe climate change is a serious threat.



PROTECTED AREAS

90% believe existing national monument designations for some public lands protected over the last decade should be kept in place.

83% believe rollbacks of laws that protect our land, water, and wildlife are an extremely or very serious problem.



WATER SUPPLY

68% believe inadequate water supply is a serious problem.

63% believe removing Clean Water Act protections from smaller streams and seasonal wetlands will have a negative impact.

CONSERVATION AND WILDLIFE

69% believe loss of habitat for fish and wildlife is an extremely or very serious problem.

62% believe rolling back Endangered Species Act protections for plants and wildlife at danger of becoming extinct will have a negative impact.

85% believe issues involving public lands, waters, and wildlife are important in deciding whether to support an elected public official.



ENERGY ON PUBLIC LANDS

82% prefer that leaders place more emphasis on protecting water, air, wildlife habitat, and recreation opportunities over maximizing the amount of land available for drilling and mining.

70% oppose fast-tracking oil, gas and mining projects on national public lands by reducing environmental reviews and local public input.

71% support keeping the requirement that oil and gas companies, rather than taxpayers, pay for all of the clean-up and land restoration costs after drilling is finished
